BUSINESS & EMPLOYMENT

Almost a guarter of survey respondents were self-employed with many people running their business from home within the parish.

Those that responded felt that improved mobile phone reception and faster broadband were the most import things that would make business easier.



In terms of infrastructure, business owners felt that rural workshops and private or shared office space would also be useful to help their business grow.



RESPONSES TO OUR RESIDENTS' SURVEY

Thank you to the many residents that responded to our recent residents survey.

Of the 317 surveys that were sent out to households within the parish 106 were returned to us by post and a further 51 people completed the survey online.

Of those respondents almost 64% were female and just over 36% were men.

ENVIRONMENT, WILDLIFE & NATURAL ENVIRONMENT

One of the many reasons residents enjoy living in St Mabyn Parish is the beautiful countryside which surrounds us.

Not surprisingly, the vast majority of survey respondents were keen to protect both the natural landscape that defines our area and the wildlife that thrives in our countryside.

One of the ways we can do this is

to carry out a Local Landscape Character Assessment (LLCA) that will define just what is so special about our landscape.

CONNECTIVITY, TRAFFIC & TRANSPORT

Public transport is clearly a concern to residents with less than 10% of respondents saying that they were happy with existing arrangements.

Just under 40% of respondents felt facilities did not meet their needs and over 50% of people did not use public transport at all.

With so many people taking to the roads it is hardly surprising that residents of Longstone voiced concern about speeding along the busy B3266.

FUTURE HOUSING **NEED**

One of the more contentious subjects is the need for future

residential development in the village. A number of survey respondents made it clear they felt no further housing of any sort was needed.

Younger people living with their parents or those on the housing list may take a different view however.

What emerged very clearly from the survey results was that if housing is needed in the future it should be small in scale and situated on land within existing settlements where possible.



Larger scale development either at the the edges or between settlements was not considered an attractive option by most respondents.

In fact, support for local community facilities was by far and away the issue that received the most comments in our survey.

Many people also felt that easier access to health facilities would be of benefit and with an ageing parish population this would seem to make sense

In addition to the attractive agricultural landscape that makes our parish such a pleasure to live in, we are also

Support for the preservation of our historic sites and local culture was strong in the survey.

EDUCATION & YOUNG CHILDREN

The majority of people who responded to our survey were 50 years or older in age. Despite this there was a strong feeling that younger people need a better say in the future of our parish.

When asked how younger people might better be represented most felt that the school should play a part in this or that a

Youth Council should be set up. Failing this, you felt the Parish Council should have a special youth representative.
